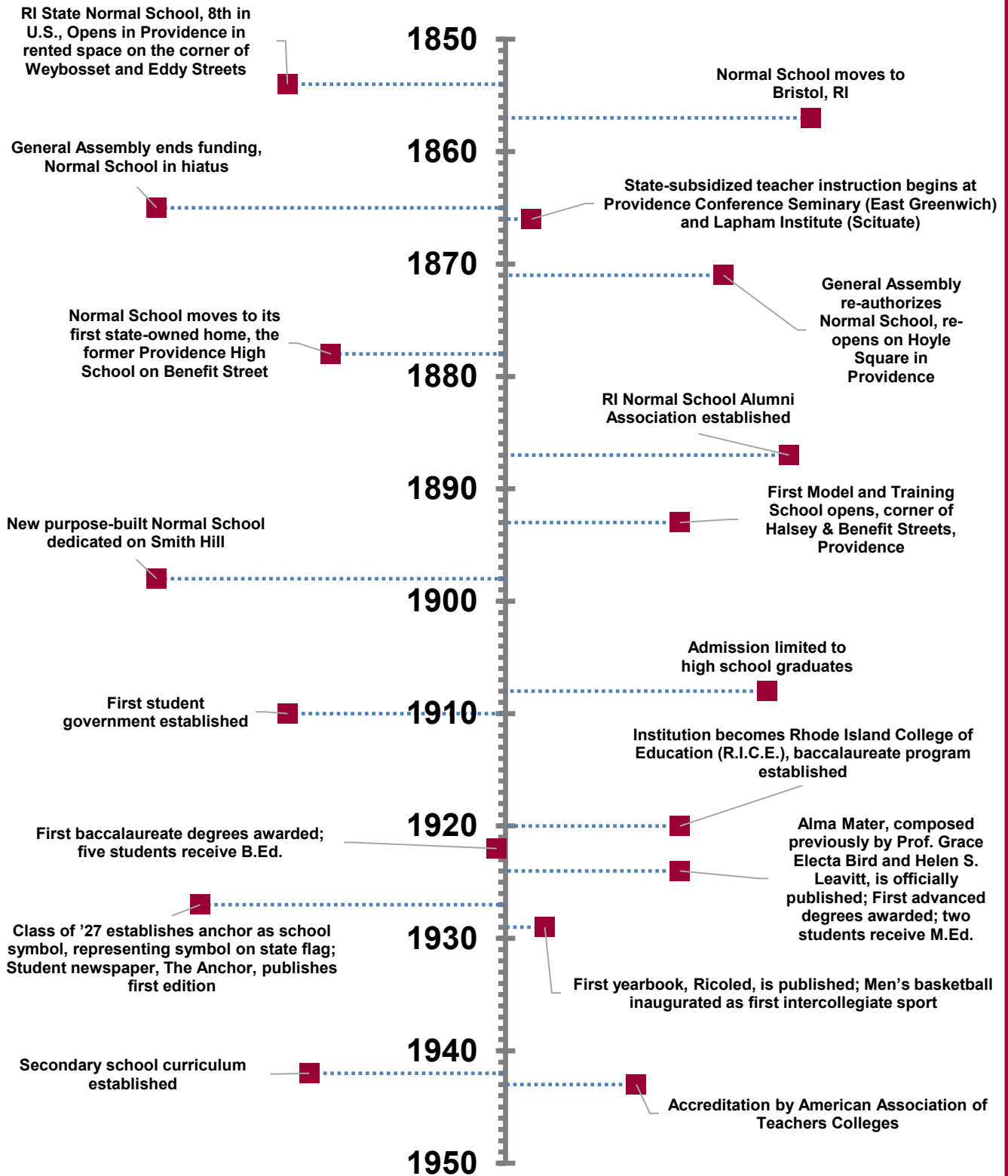

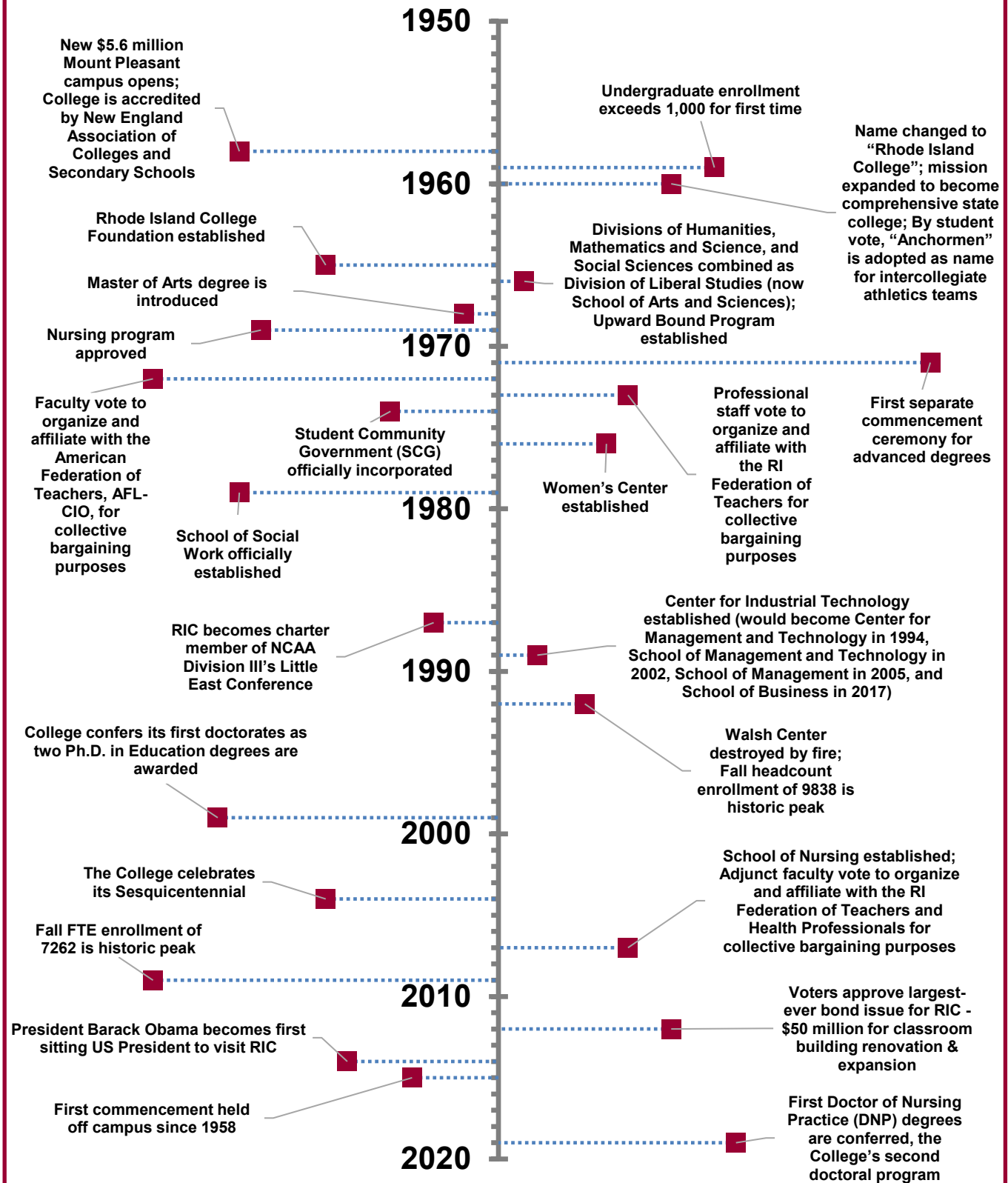

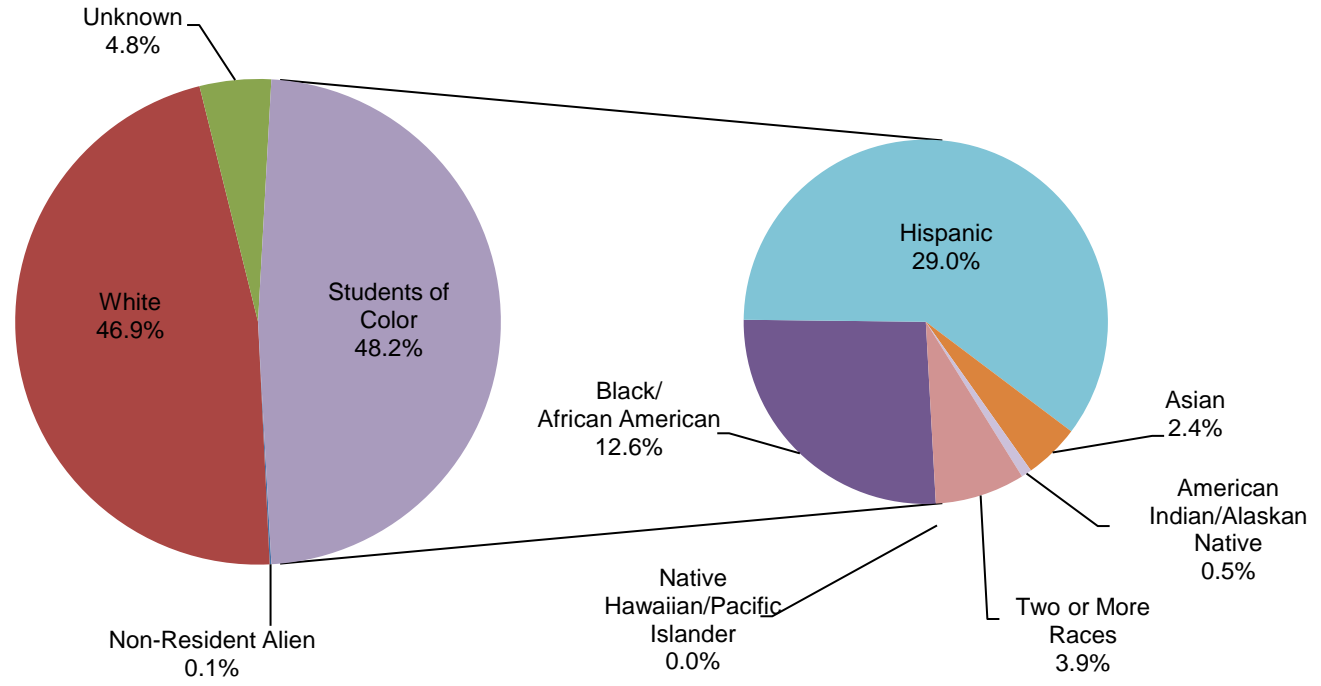

Chart 1.1--Enrolled Freshmen by Racial/Ethnic Group



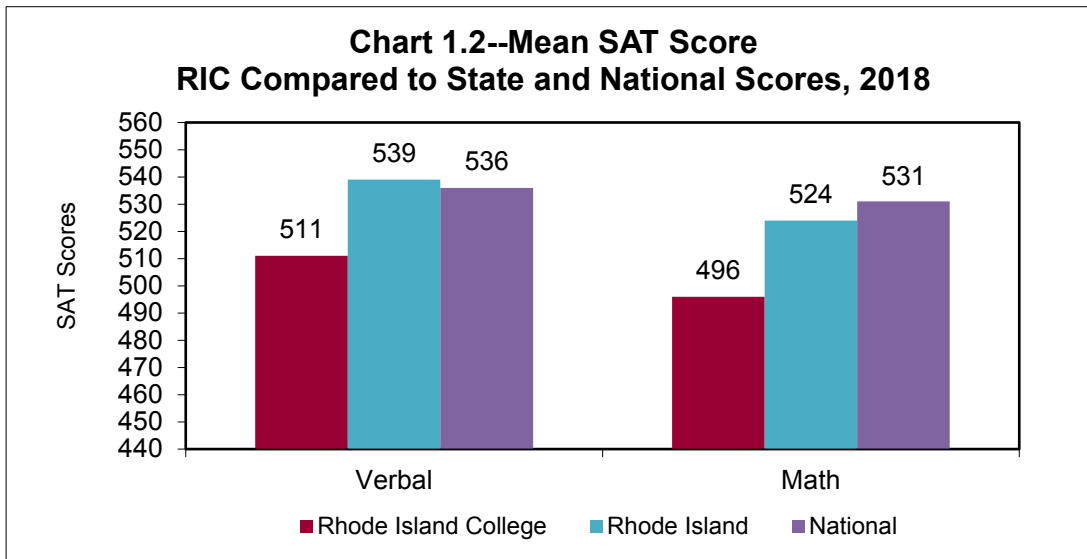

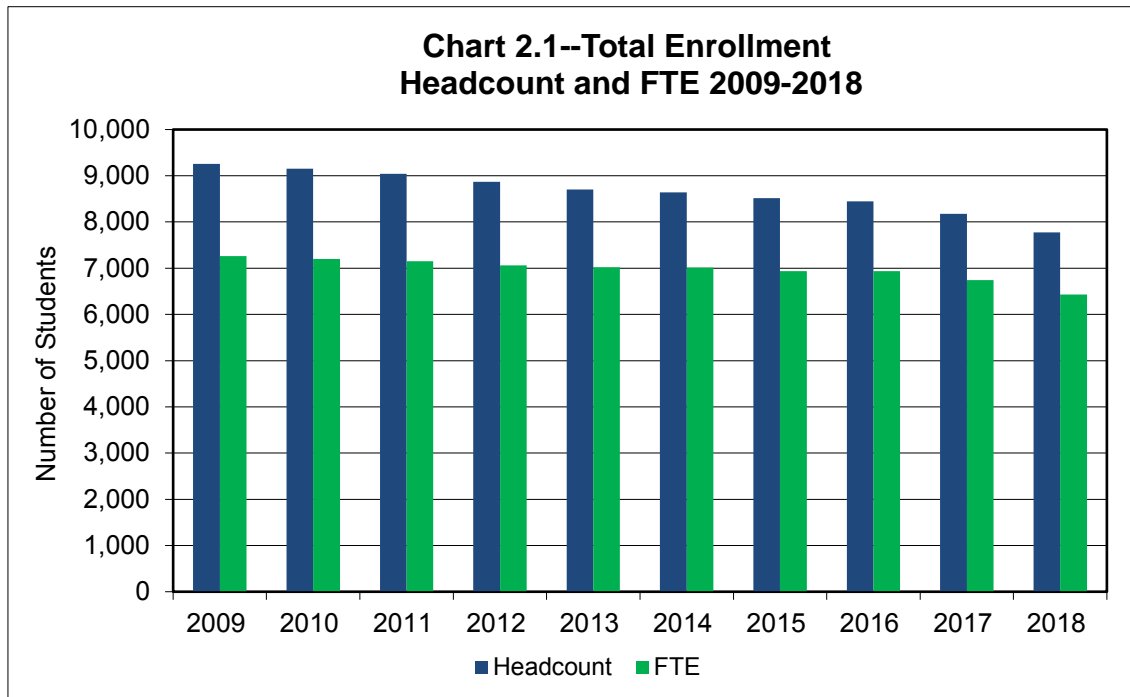

Fall 2009-Fall 2018**

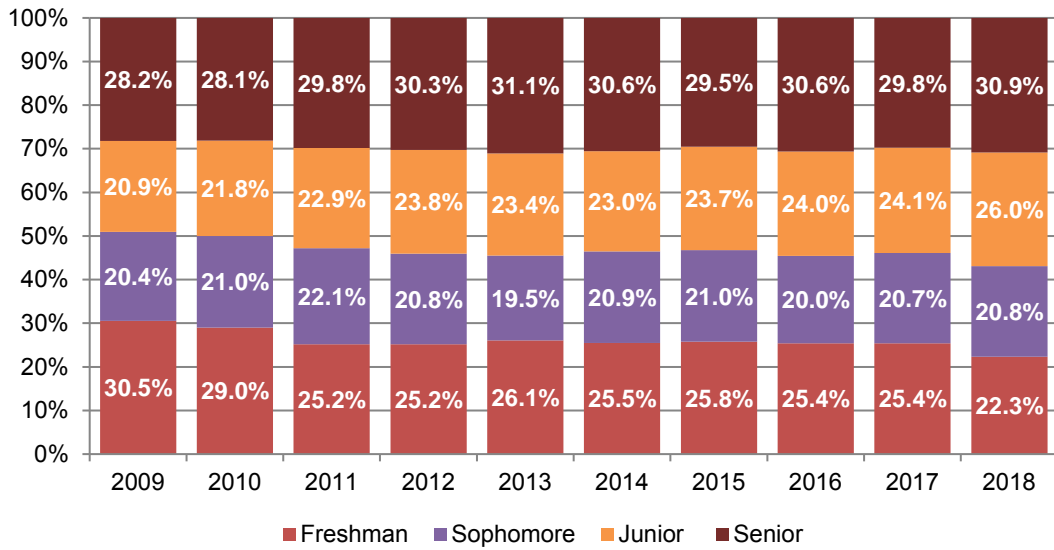

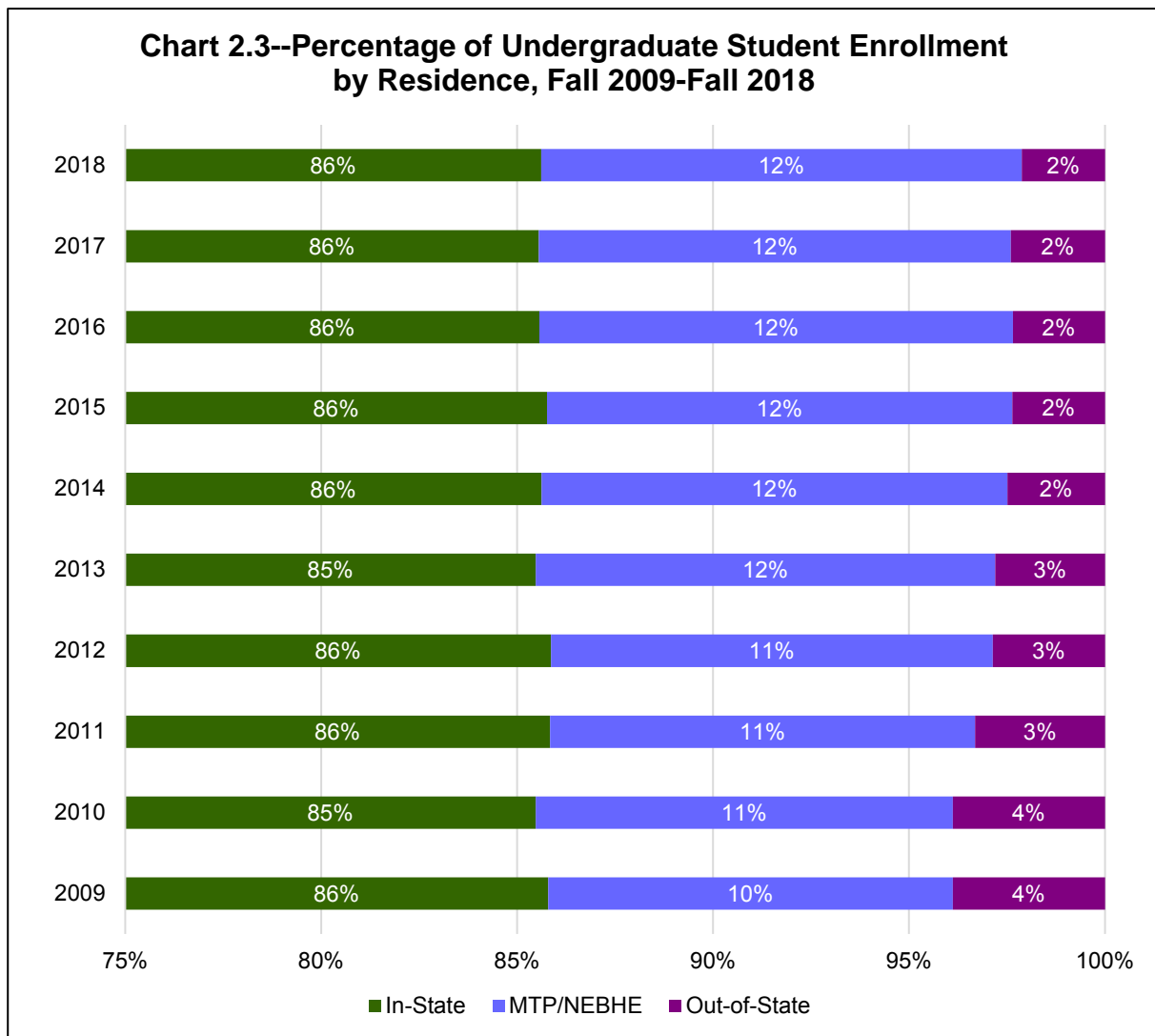

Chart 2.4--Residence Hall Students Class Composition, Fall 2018

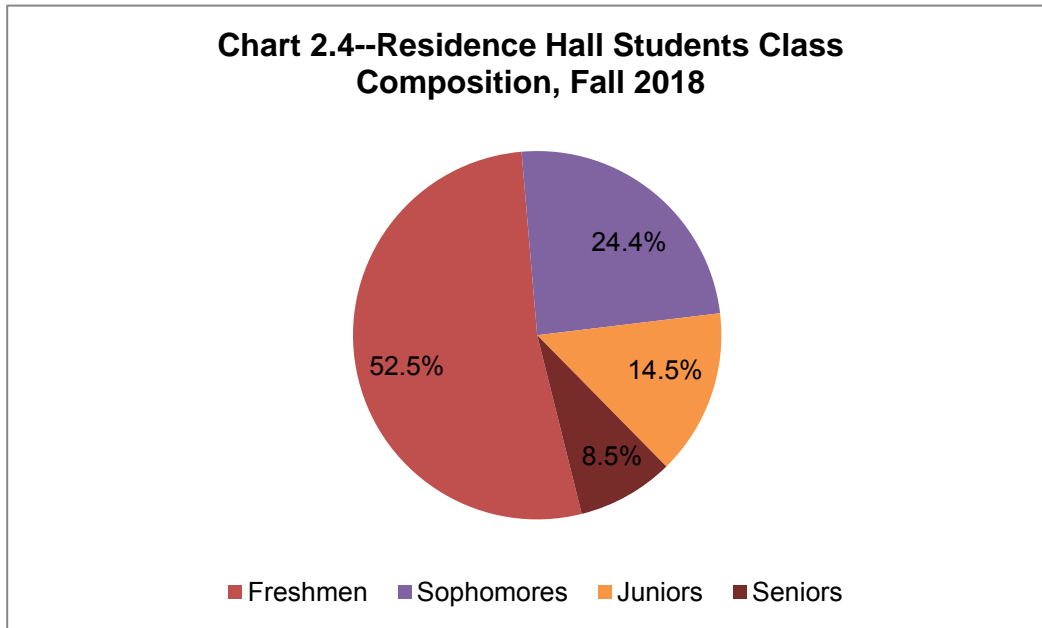

Chart 2.5-Undergraduate Students by Age, 2009-2018

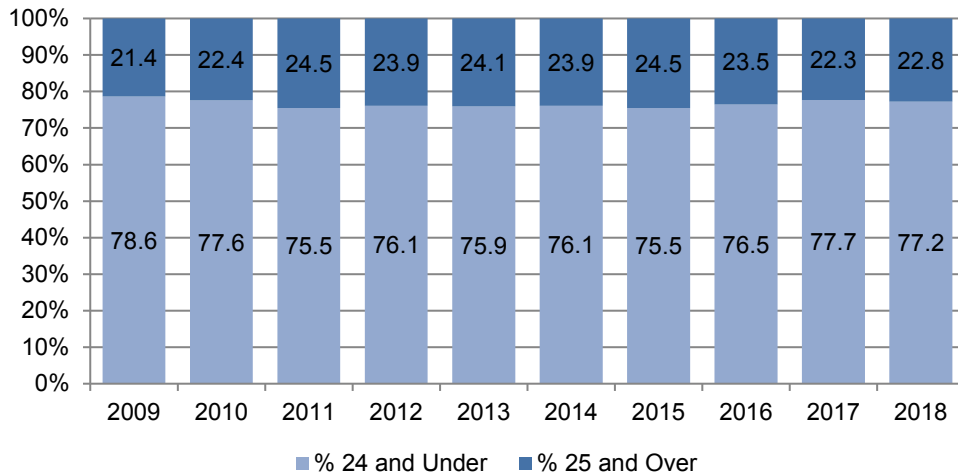


Chart 2.6-Graduate Students by Age, 2009-2018

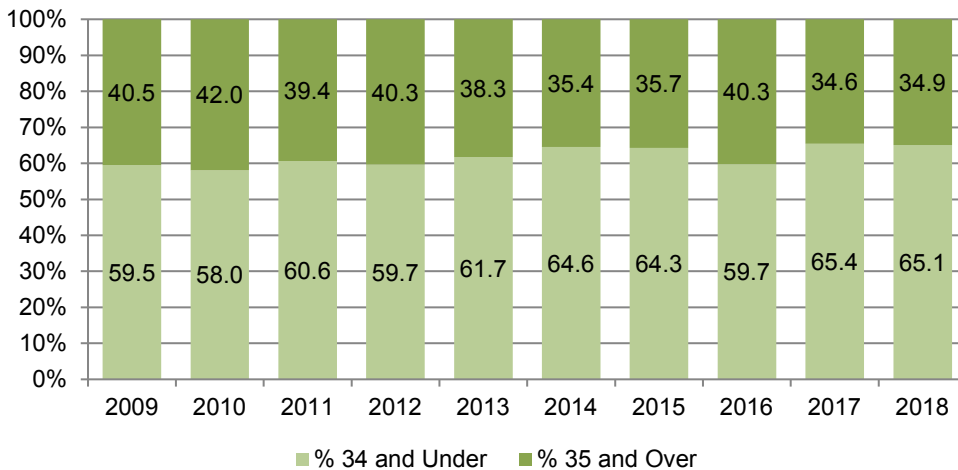

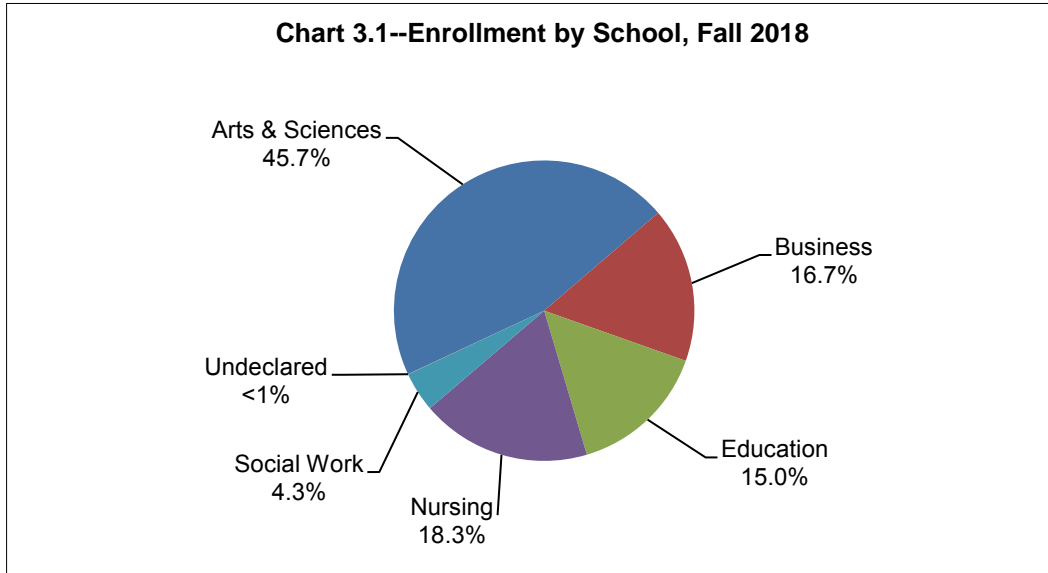

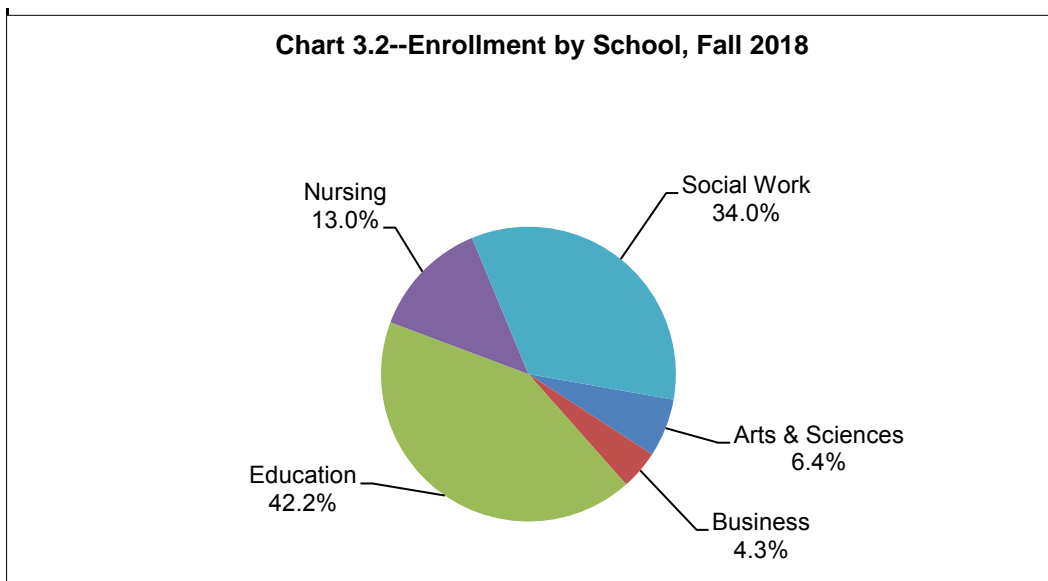

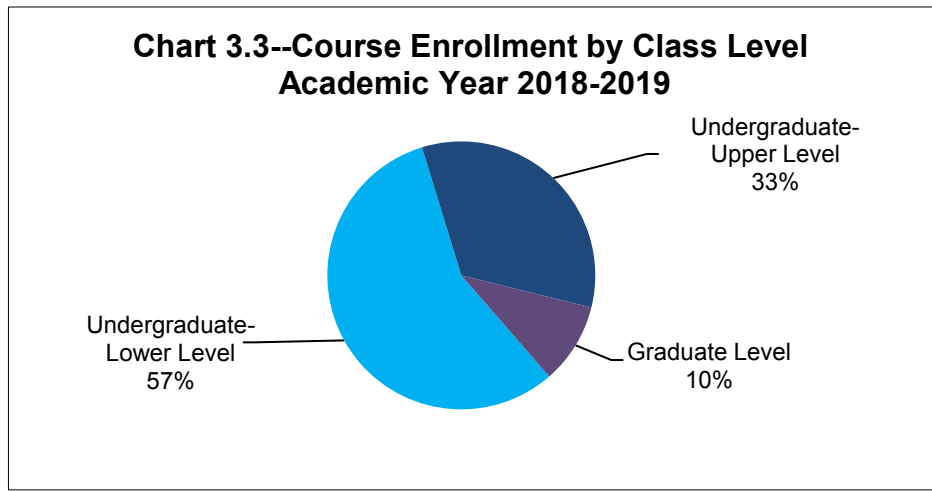

Fall 2008-2017 Cohorts**

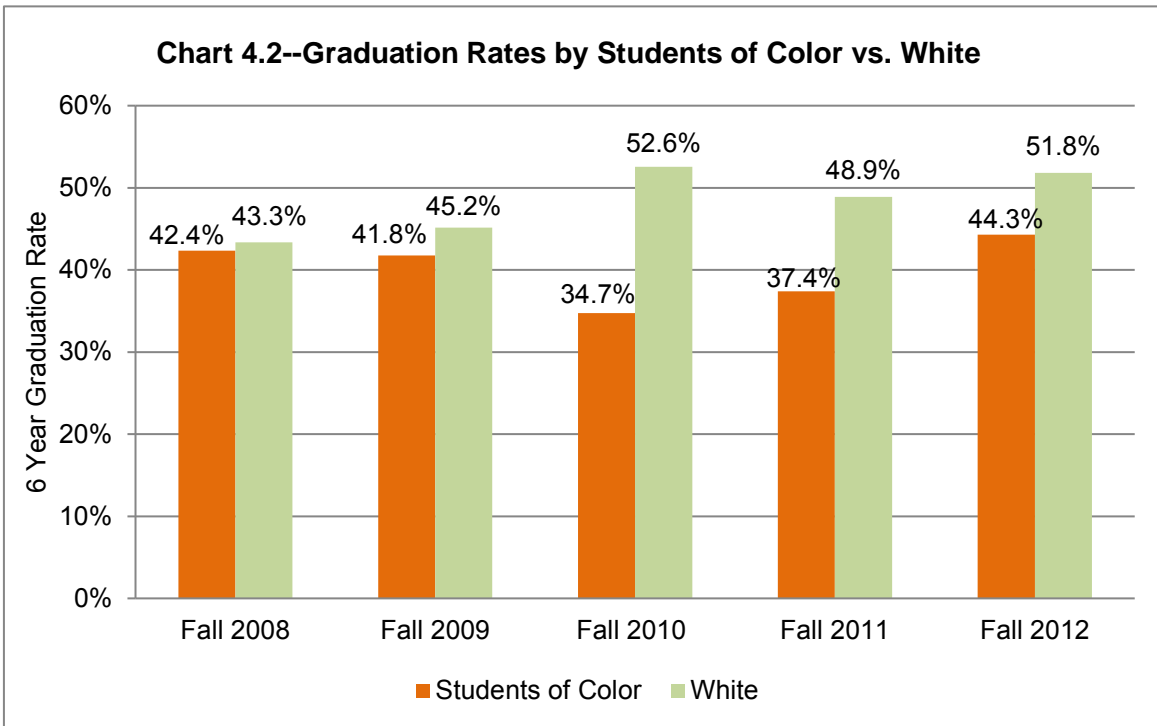
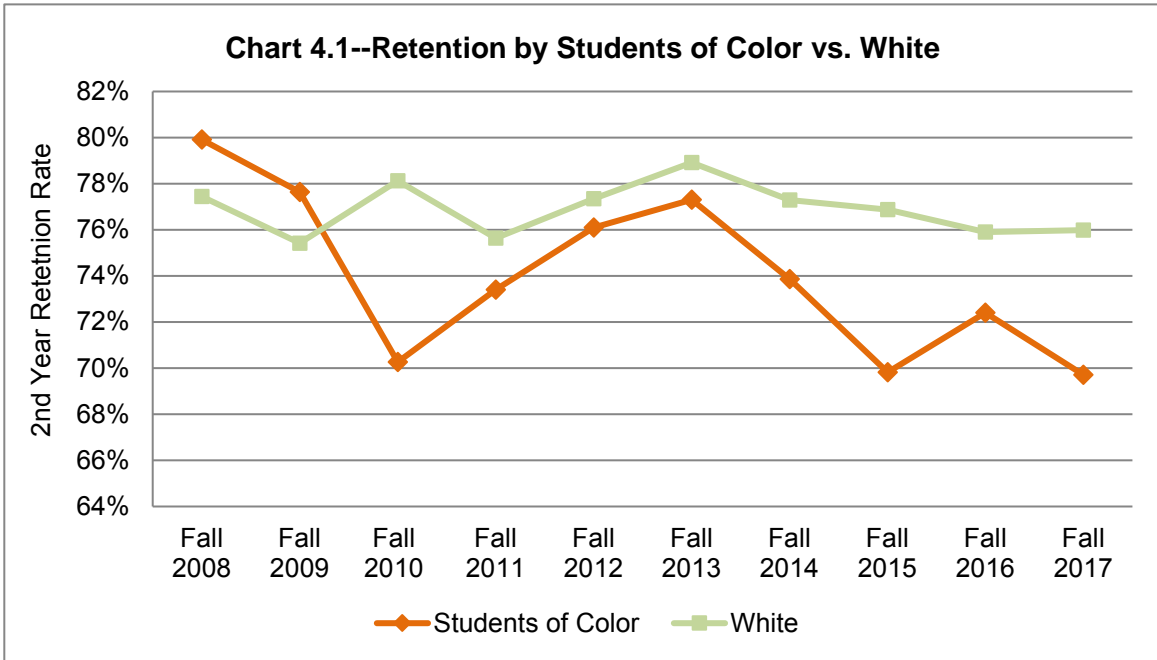

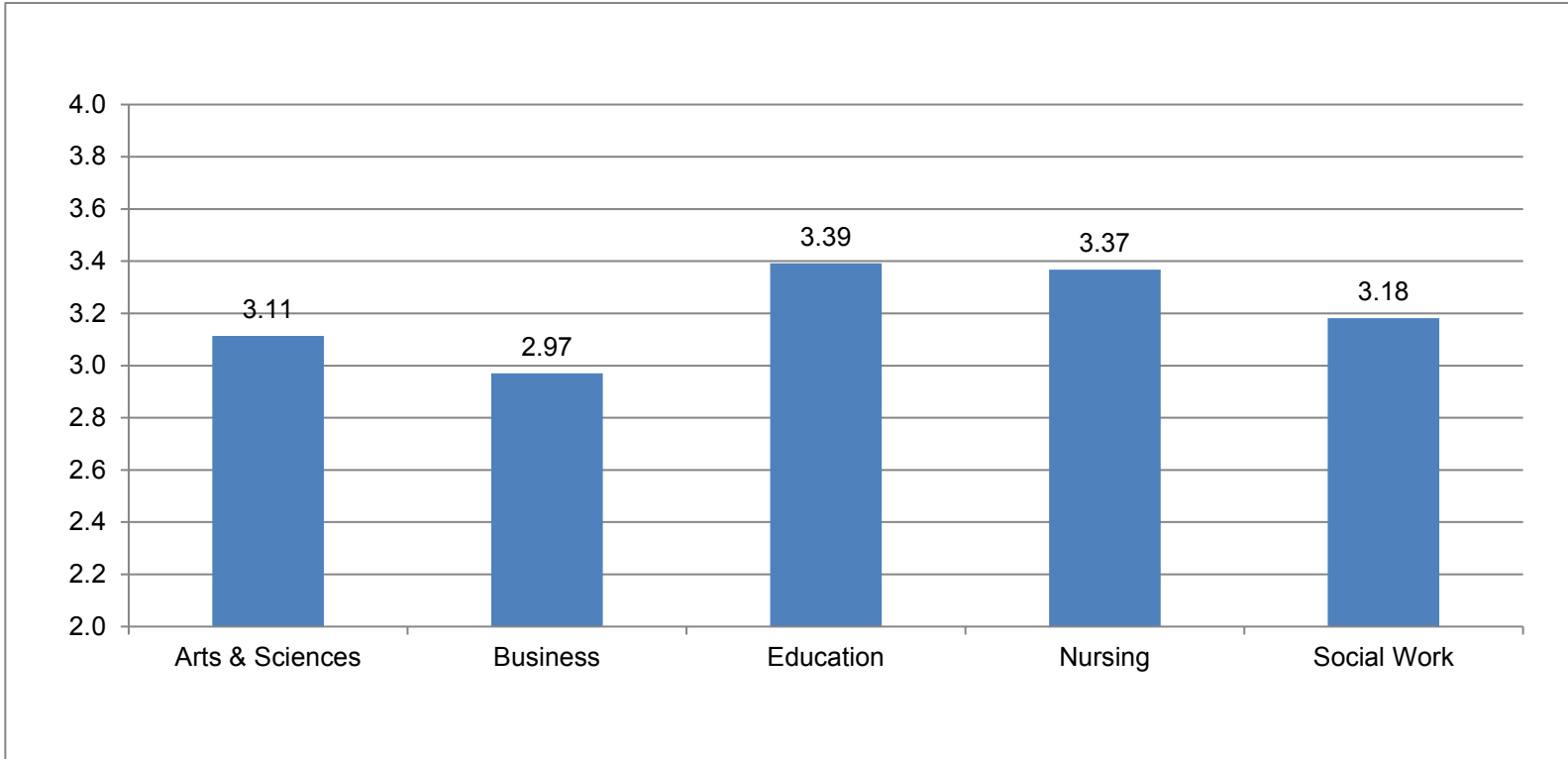

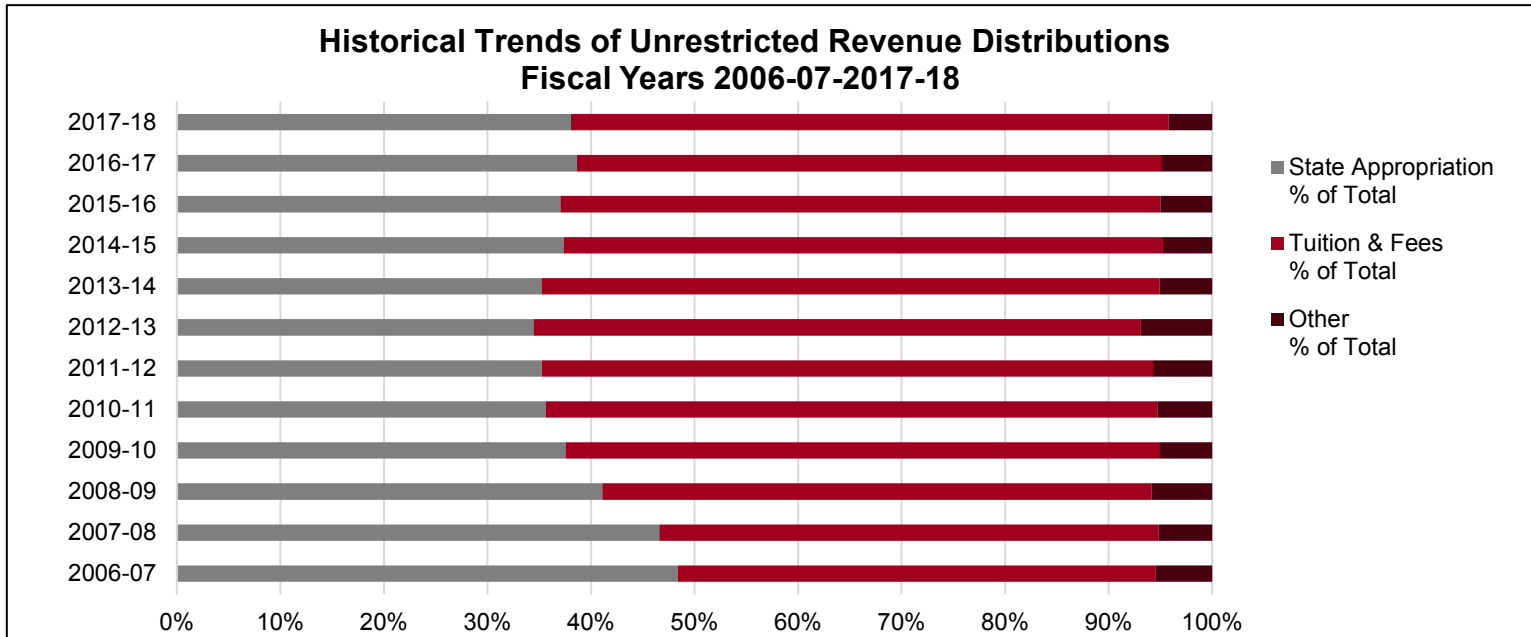
